BEGINNING

As you can see by the heading on this newsletter, this is the very first edition of a publication authorized by the June 1987 annual meeting of the National Farm & Ranch Business Management Education Association (NFRBMEA).

HISTORY

Since not all of you readers are members you probably never have been exposed to the organization and its purposes. So a short history might be in order.

In 1973 A group of Minnesota farm management teachers, together with University of Minnesota farm management professor Edgar Persons, decided it might be a good idea to get together once a year to discuss ideas and problems connected with teaching business management to farm families.

Since no one knew if the idea would "fly," the first and second meetings were exploratory and were set up on an invitational basis. The first and second conferences were held at the vo-tech institute in Faribault, MN. The idea did fly and as the years went by more and more states became involved, and the invitations went out to all farm and ranch management teachers on the mailing list. The annual conferences soon moved out of MN and have been held, from time to time, in Washington, North Dakota, South Dakota and Nebraska.

As the years went by it became more and more evident (especially to those states hosting the conferences since they stuck out their necks financially) that a formal organization was needed. So a committee was put together at the St. Cloud, MN meeting in 1984 to report to the next year's conference at Pierre, SD. The teachers present at that meeting signed the charter and elected the NFRBMEA's first officers.

The 1986-87 officers discussed the idea of instituting a newsletter for the organization and brought that up at the business meeting at the June 1987 Holiday Inn conference at Worthington, MN. The membership endorsed the idea and appointed John Hest, Hawley, MN as its first editor.

WHAT DO YOU WANT FROM YOUR NEWSLETTER?

The mandate given to me, by the officers and members voting at the Worthington meeting:

- 1. To get the newsletter going,
- 2. Name the newsletter,
- 3. Publish four issues per year,
- 4. Further the cause of farm and ranch management education.

Other than that, you can see that your editor has lots of literary license, at least for this first issue. For future issues I hope that you, the reader, will determine what you would like to see in the letter. Please fill out the blank on the other side and send it back to me.
