This is the theme for the 2012 National Farm Business Management Conference planned for June 8-12, 2014 in Salt Lake City, Utah. The hotel site is the Radisson Hotel Salt Lake City Downtown, 215 West South Temple Street. A twenty minute, 7 mile, "metro" (UTA Trax) ride from the airport will get you to the hotel. The Conference agenda is coming together well, just a few tour and speaker details to be worked out (the preliminary agenda for your planning purposes is posted on the conference web page).

Salt Lake City is nicknamed the "Crossroads of the west". Mountain Men and early pioneers, overland freight, stage coach, pony express, telegraph and railroad connected the east with the west all passed through the Salt Lake Valley.

We invite you to join us in the "crossroads of the west" this coming June for a conference packed with information to help you as a farm business management educator/consultant. In addition to invaluable networking the conference presentations will provide education about: public lands issues as they pertain to agriculture, water issues both in the west and for the nation as urban demands for water increase in all areas of the nation, identification and evaluation of farm/ranch resources for business sustainability, and managing buy the numbers. Those interested in seeing and learning about cattle ranching in the west will want to participate in a post-conference tour planned for Thursday afternoon and Friday June 13. The conference agenda include the details for this post conference tour.

Salt Lake City is filled with family activities within walking distance of the hotel, visit www.visitsaltlake.com to see the many offerings in downtown Salt Lake City for families and evening activities.

With Utah having more National Parks than any other state you may want to plan your trip with a day or two to spare. You could fly in or out of Las Vegas, 8 hours south of Salt Lake, and see the Zions, Bryce Canyon or the Grand Canyon. 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National Council for Agricultural Education Update

The vision of the National Council for Agricultural Education is to be the collective leadership voice for Agricultural education in the United States.

Since the last update we have met via several conference calls, and attended our Fall NCAE Board meeting in Indianapolis, Indiana from September 23 - 25, 2013. Once again, we have decided to have our face to face meetings in Indianapolis if possible to save member organizations money. I will try to summarize the major activities of the Council, and those in particular that impact NFRBMEA members.

The financial position for the Council has improved a little since my last update. We have current assets of \$172,113 at the end of our fiscal year, June 30, 2013. That is approximately \$30,000 higher than a year ago. We are projecting revenue this year at \$97,850, and expenses of \$113,850. We are planning on using some of our excess funds from last year on special council projects such as the "Teach Ag", and "SAE Renewal". This includes the summit in January 2014. We are actively seeking grants and donations to help with our council projects.

The main content of the meeting was focused around our five main goal areas we set up to work on for at least the next 2 years. Once again they are:

1. Develop an action plan to ensure the recruitment, preparation and retention of a diverse, high quality teacher supply.
2. Strengthen the voice and impact of the Council within the Profession.
3. SAE Renewal - Relevance and impact of SAE on student performance.
4. Collect the data needed to demonstrate local program relevance and drive program improvement.
5. Review and revise the national content and program standards.



While we are constantly working on all 5 goal areas, during the past year the Council has focused primarily on goal #1. We have been working with Ellen Thompson on the "National Teach Ag Campaign." The Council also sponsored the 2013 National Ag Ed Summit for two days at the end of January where the whole topic for the summit was developing plans to ensure our teacher supply. Beginning immediately we are also incorporating a "global" presence into each of the goal areas.

During the calendar year 2014 we plan on working primarily on goal #3, SAE Renewal. We plan on doing this several ways. We plan to review and revise all SAE materials. We plan on hosting the 2014 Ag Ed summit, and have the only topic being "SAE Renewal". John Deere is our primary sponsor of this summit. We will also focus on goal area #4, "collect the data needed to demonstrate local program relevance and drive program improvement."

I am anxiously looking forward to being the chair of the NCAE during calendar year 2014. As a reminder, the NFRBMEA is beginning to look for a new NCAE member representative to begin their term in January of 2015. Please communicate with me or another NFRBMEA officer if you have any questions or want to be considered for that position.

We have conference calls scheduled for the third Tuesday of each month and our next face to face meeting will be in Indianapolis in March 2014. Remember to visit our website at <https://www.ffa.org/thecouncil/>.
